#### A MESSAGE FROM OUR FOUNDER

#### Founder of the Campaign for Greener Arbitrations

For me, April is not the "<u>cruellest month</u>", it is the month in which Earth Day falls, when we celebrate our efforts in the sustainability space, looking back as well as looking forward. I have been doing a fair bit of both recently as I prepared to hand over the presidency of the campaign to Cherine and Christine.

It was illuminating to look back at a couple of blog posts I wrote back in 2019 and 2020, not only at the post that launched the Green Pledge – A Zero-Impact Arbitration? Let's talk – which began "As an arbitration community, we have talked a lot about how we might arbitrate climate change issues. We have not spent the same amount of time talking about how as a community we might address climate change" – a comment that certainly cannot be made now – but also at others, including 1999 called and wants its Procedural Order back and We have Flight Pride when we should have Flight Shame which give an insight into my concerns about the way the arbitration community seemed to be unconcerned about the environment at this time.

As I re-read the posts I was struck by how much the arbitration has changed in the intervening years. Thanks, largely, to the incredible work done by the Green Protocols team, there is no excuse now for Procedural Order No.1 to look like it was drafted in the last century.

There is a strong sense that parties, counsel and arbitrators are more aware of the impact their professional lives have on the environment, not just their personal lives, and there is an enthusiasm and support for the CGA that I would not have believed possible when I first mooted the idea that the arbitration community should come together to try and address its colossal carbon footprint.

Of course there is still much to do, particularly with regard to accurately monitoring the environmental impact of our practices. Over the years, the CGA has been acutely conscious of the challenges of accurately assessing our carbon footprint and I am hopeful that the new Innovation and Policy Task Force can move the needle in this area. Yet there is also much to celebrate: a global awareness and discussion of ESG issues, practical and policy discussions about climate change, and, most importantly, individuals taking concrete actions on a daily basis to reduce their impact on the environment.

Five years have elapsed since the Green Pledge was launched and four since the CGA was launched on Earth Day 2020. Unfortunately, that means we are closer to a tipping point for our environment. As members of the arbitration community, we are in a privileged position. Now is the time to use that position to influence change, both in our practices and, where we can, in policy.

It was John F. Kennedy who said "time and the worlds do not stand still. Change is the law of life and those who look only to the past or the present are certain to miss the future."

Time and worlds don't stand still. And we can't either.

Congratulations to the fearless bikers for taking up the challenge for such worthy causes and their outstanding green performance! Whilst you may not be able to cycle to your next hearing, the ride demonstrates that concrete actions and a joint effort to adopt more climate-friendly behaviours, whether in your mode of travel or the conduct of your proceedings, can go a long way to reduce the environmental impact of international arbitration.







#### Green Walk



Just like Green philosophers, we believe at the CGA in the synergies between walking and creative thinking. On 21 March, on the occasion of the beginning of Spring, the CGA partnered up with the Scottish Arbitration Centre for a joint Green Walk. As part of this event, CGA leaders Andrew Mackenzie, Tara Braulotte and Charlotte Matthews led a Sustainability Walk in the Jardin des Tuileries in which our participants were asked to reflect on what sustainability measures they could implement in their daily practices. The following proposals were shared by our participants:



- The organization of in-person hearings should consider where hearing participants are based.
   Hearings should be organized in places in which the most people can access by train, so that flying, if necessary, is reduced to the strict minimum.
- Paper hearing bundles are a thing of the past and should no longer be used.
- Printing can be avoided and note-taking can be leveled up by using the right technology (e.g. by using Remarkable tablets).
- We should no longer buy plastic water bottles, but use reusable bottles instead!







### Decarbonization, Deforestation and Due Diligence



On 20 March, the CGA organized a panel on "Decarbonization, Deforestation, and Due Diligence: Synergies Between Europe's ESG Regulatory Measures and Sustainability Efforts in Arbitration" at the Linklaters Paris office. The panel was led by CGA Global Co-Chair Cherine Foty, Jessica Crow, Co-Chair for Innovation and Policy, ESG expert Hannah Edmonds-Camara, and the French Member of Parliament Eleonore Caroit.

This event constituted a fascinating and informative dive into current and upcoming regulations and steps being taken by France, the EU, companies and practitioners toward sustainable practices and the reduction of greenhouse emissions.


It was also quite fitting for this all female panel to be hosted during Women's History Month!

to shaping the future of international arbitration by applying the impressive rules and guidelines already in place.















# Regional Spotlight: CGA Caribbean

#### Focus on the Bahamas

The Bahamas is a country of 700 islands and cays situated in the Atlantic Ocean just off the coast of Florida State, USA. Eighty percent of the Commonwealth of the Bahamas is within three feet (or 1 meter) of mean sea level which has risen over the past 100 years by 1 foot (or 0.3 meters). This has been exasperated by the tropical storms and severe hurricanes which have caused significant damage to our ecosystems, shorelines and vegetation; not withstanding the significant loss of lives and property. The Bahamas has a goal to reduce GHG emission of 30% in order to address climate change from a mitigation and adaptation perspective and have put in place plans and strategies to achieve this.

During the past two years, the Prime Minister of the Bahamas has become one of the more prominent speakers internationally on climate change and has addressed the severe effects of carbon emissions by the larger countries and its devastating effects on our marine environment, vegetation and rising sea levels. Our country's rock is made out of limestone and the water table is very high, thus any excessive rainfall from storms creates massive flooding island wide especially in the capital of the Bahamas. However, being a small nation, there is little we can do to combat what larger countries such as the U.S., China and other large nations are doing to damage the planet.

One of the initiatives the Bahamas is working on through a private organization called Coral Vita, is to try to restore coral reefs which are being destroyed by an alarming rate by rebuilding ecosystems that cannot sustain these devastating storms.

# CGA Caribbean Region (continued)

This is being performed in Freeport, Grand Bahama, where a number of companies and non-profit organizations are working together to achieve a common goal. The Government has also collaborated with partners such as Rock Mountain Institute, an organization that advocates clean energy to develop stormproof solar installations on island such as Abaco and Ragged Island.

On the financial side, Blue Carbon Credits is another avenue the Bahamas is using to combat climate change costs and it is estimated that an endowment fund of \$40-\$50 billion can be built by selling these carbon credits to larger countries. This will be done through the process of monetizing the value of the ocean-based mangroves and seagrass beds in the Bahamian waters according to Mr. Anthony Ferguson, president of CFAL. And the funds raised will go directly to covering the massive costs of destruction due to climate change and maintaining our ecosystems, forestry, land infrastructure, vegetation and protecting our marine environment. This initiative will also be in conjunction with our Caribbean partners through CARICOM.

On 1 July 2020, the government of the Bahamas banned the importing of single use plastic bags, plastic drinking straws, plastic utensils and Styrofoam containers, making any importation of these items illegal. These items have been replaced with cardboard containers, bio-degradable utensils, and drinking straws. This great initiative addresses both marine pollution and waste management as discarding plastic items in our beautiful ocean waters has had devastating effects on our marine life and coral reefs. In addition, the release of balloons into the air is illegal as they too were found in our ocean waters as releasing deadly toxins.

If those initiatives were not made into law, the then Minister of Environment stated that the pollution of those items could have caused the Bahamas up to BSD 8.5 million annually in losses for the country due to the damage to our beaches and marine life. This would indeed impact our number one industry – Tourism.

At the Bahamas Financial Services Board Industry Development Series: Financial Crimes Across Borders conference held in February 2024, our Caribbean Committee Co-Chair, Nicolette Gardiner, was able to inquire, as an attendee, about the policies put in place to incorporate ESG factors into the regulatory aspects of the Bahamas Government and Policies. The panel was led by government regulators including Christina Rolle, Executive Director of The Securities Commission of the Bahamas and Karen Rolle, Inspector, Banks & Trust Companies – Central Bank of the Bahamas.

With an attendance of over 200 financial industry colleagues, it was Nicolette Gardiner's way to bring attention to the importance of ESG practices and how companies can incorporate them into their company's investment strategies and decisions. This can be achieved through socially responsible investment, best-in-class investment where ESG criteria are established by companies, green bonds and green investments and impact investments. Mrs. Rolle noted that the Government of the Bahamas is socially responsible and incorporating these very important factors and issues when deciding on selection companies for completing national projects.







# Individual Spotlight:

# Meet Zoltán Novák

In this Individual Spotlight series, the CGA is pleased to introduce you to **Zoltán Novák**, expert in IP litigation and international commercial arbitration, Partner at the Budapest office of <u>Taylor Wessing</u> and avid sustainability supporter.

## What do you know about the CGA and are you involved in the Campaign? If so, how?

I am aware that the CGA strives to reduce the environmental footprint of international arbitration by advocating sustainable practices and actions like minimizing travel, reducing paper usage and adopting digital technologies. The CGA seeks to raise awareness and encourage people in the arbitration community to prioritize sustainability.

I have participated in similar campaigns myself – last year, for example, we contributed two chapters to a research project exploring avenues for climate

litigation. My first direct involvement in the CGA may be this interview but I will certainly use my network to spread the message and will continue participating in this and similar campaigns in the future.



For me, sustainability is a general attitude that encompasses social and governance concerns as well as environmental ones. Wasting natural resources for a marginal gain in comfort and convenience – like using air travel on shorter distances – is of course part of the problem. But there is a social dimension as well. If you live in a city and always take an airplane to fly from your city to another one for a hearing or conference, your perspective will necessarily be limited to how people in the cities see the world.

You will largely avoid exposure to parts of society who live in more rural areas and on the periphery. This will make vast swathes of the continent "flyover country" even in Europe, increasing the rift between social classes and regions. My main social concern is the lack of understanding between different parts of society. Taking the land route during travels, experiencing the way of life and thinking that prevails outside the cities and central regions is one way to alleviate this phenomenon.

We have heard about and are impressed with your climate-friendly travelling exploits! During Paris Arbitration Week, did you know that CIArb organized an all-green biking itinerary from London to Paris, to raise awareness of the CGA?

I have certainly heard about the sustainability walk organized by CGA and the Scottish Arbitration Centre. In the past couple of years, I travelled to the Paris Arbitration Week mostly by train. As a keen biker myself, however, I would love to arrive to PAW next year on bike – maybe after taking it with me on the train. These are great initiatives to make more people aware of the importance of sustainability.









# Individual Spotlight: Meet Zoltán Novák (continued)

Could you please tell us about your own eco-friendly travelling exploits?

Besides PAW, I have in the past years travelled by train to conferences in Amsterdam, Istanbul, Kyiv, Riga and Stockholm among others. Train travel to Western Europe is actually quite fast (few people realize that, with a night train through Vienna or Zurich and the TGV, it takes only about 16 hours – and, considering night travel, only a half business day – to get from Budapest to Paris). Travelling in the Eastern half of the continent can be more of an adventure and it certainly takes longer – but you can always work on the train or take a pause and enjoy the view. Besides prioritizing low-carbon transportation methods, climate-friendly travelling practices involve opting for eco-conscious accommodations (e.g. cheaper hotels with eco-friendly initiatives), and minimizing waste (e.g. by preferring dine-in restaurants to take-away food).

# Call to Action Paperless Options



Let's examine a daily behavior that can be handled in a greener way: **note taking**. While paper reduction may not be the largest source of carbon emissions in an arbitration practice, it is one of the easiest shifts to make. Transitioning from traditional writing pads and plastic ink pens to e-paper tablets or smart notebooks and pens is a fairly simple adjustment. The following is a list of options to consider in this category:

Not yet ready for this change? Consider using eco-friendly or biodegradable pens and recycled or FSC (Forest Stewardship Council) paper.

#### V. MINIMISE PRINTING AND USE OF PAPER

- A. Arbitral Institutions shall carefully consider the need to print documents and shall endeavour to print only what is deemed to be strictly necessary.
- B. Where printing is deemed necessary, Arbitral Institutions shall endeavour to minimise the environmental footprint of the printing. Examples include:
  - B.1 Using environmentally friendly toner and ink;
  - B.2 Using recycled and recyclable, chlorine-free and / or tree-free paper;
  - B.3 Using eco-friendly printers (making use, for example, of LED UV printing);
  - B.4 Disposing of printed documents and associated materials (e.g. toner bottles) in an environmentally friendly way, where appropriate. Examples of printing disposal, whilst adhering to confidentiality obligations, might include recycling and composting; and
  - B.5 Considering whether it is necessary to courier hard copies abroad or whether it is possible to use a local printing service.
- C. Arbitral Institutions shall encourage attendees at all meetings to bring laptops or tablets for document review and electronic note taking and to display information using screens / projectors instead of printing documents. Stationary shall only be provided upon request.
- Arbitral Institutions shall encourage the use of business development and marketing materials in digital form.
- E. Arbitral Institutions shall endeavour to maintain electronic case files.
- F. Individual printers within offices are to be discouraged or limited.
- G. Consider using multi-purpose machines for printing, copying, scanning and faxing.
- H. Regularly update subscriber mailing lists to reduce the volume of general communications via both electronic and paper transmission, and endeavour to eliminate or reduce printed mailing wherever practical. This step shall also serve to confirm current contact information.
- Wherever available for accounts payable and receivable, implement digital funding transfers to reduce the need for printed checks and mailings.
